Pope Francis Invites Us: Jubilee Year of Mercy (Misericordiae Vultus, Bull of Indiction of the Extraordinary Jubilee of Mercy, #2)



"We need constantly to contemplate the mystery of mercy. It is a wellspring of joy, serenity, and peace. Our salvation depends on it. Mercy: the word reveals the very mystery of the Most Holy Trinity. Mercy: the ultimate and supreme act by which God comes to meet us. Mercy: the fundamental law that dwells in the heart of every person who looks sincerely into the eyes of his brothers and sisters on the path of life. Mercy: the bridge that connects God and man, opening our hearts to the hope of being loved forever despite our sinfulness."

From December 08, 2015 to November 20, 2106, the Jubilee of Mercy will be celebrated with an extraordinary call to conversion, away from sin and towards greater holiness. The Holy Doors at the Vatican are open, and special graces are made available. Three church doors in our diocese have been designated to symbolize the doors at the Vatican, and we are planning a late spring event in the design of a pilgrimage. **Action**: plan on joining us on our pilgrimage.

<u>Description of the logo</u>: The motto *Merciful Like the Father* serves as an invitation to follow the merciful example of the Father who asks us not to judge or condemn but to forgive and to give love and forgiveness without measure (Lk 6:37-38). The logo expresses the profound way in which the Good Shepherd touches the flesh of humanity and does so with a love with the power to change one's life. One particular feature worthy of note is that while the Good Shepherd, in his great mercy, takes humanity upon himself, his eyes are merged with those of humanity. Christ sees with the eyes of Adam, and Adam with the eyes of Christ. Every person discovers in Christ, the new Adam, one's own humanity and the future that lies ahead, contemplating, in his gaze, the love of the Father.

The Lonely Ember

A member of a certain church, who previously had been attending services regularly, stopped going.

After a few weeks, the pastor decided to visit him. It was a chilly evening. The pastor found the man at home alone, sitting before a blazing fire.

December

27 Feast of the Holy Family The *Feast of the Holy Family* is a liturgical celebration in the Catholic Church in honor of Jesus , his mother, the Blessed Virgin Mary, and Saint Joseph, as a family. The primary purpose of this feast is to present the Holy Family as a model for Christian families.

January

Feast of Mary the Mother of God This wonderful title, Mary, the Mother of God, "Theotokos", reveals a profound truth not only about Mary, but about each one of us. We are now invited into the very relationship that she had with her Son. We can become "God-bearers" and bring Him to all those whom we encounter in our few short days under the sun.

February

10 Ash Wednesday, beginning of Lent The seventh Wednesday before Easter and the first day of Lent, on which many Christians receive a mark of ashes on the forehead as a token of penitence and mortality.

March

Easter is the celebration of Jesus Christ's rising from the dead (His Resurrection) after His crucifixion which took place on what we now term Good Friday.

May



Celebrating Christmas: consider joining us in the Christmas Season as we celebrate the many aspects of the mystery of the birth of Christ. The season is composed of the following feasts: Feast of the Nativity (Dec25), Feast of the Holy Family, Feast of the Mary the Mother of God (Jan01), Feast of the Epiphany, and the Feast of the Baptism of the Lord. All these help uncover the depth of what it means for God to take on human flesh and dwell among us.

The cycle of the Saints adds further reverence to this time as we celebrate Saint Stephen, first martyr (Dec26), Saint John, the evangelist also known as the Divine (Dec27), Holy Innocents, infants martyred by King Herod as Jesus escaped to Egypt (Dec 28).
