"We are the Catholic Community of St. Joseph's Parish, gathered as disciples of Jesus Christ to worship God, to serve others and to grow as loving members of God's family."



Christmas, Epiphany, Baptism of the Lord: Baptism of the Lord: we are reminded that Jesus' ministry began just as ours does: by his baptism. By entering into the waters of baptism, he was identified as God's own son and filled with the Holy Spirit. That baptism unleashed great power in his life that enabled him to fulfill his calling through unimaginable demands. Jesus' relationship to God was unique, but in our own baptism, we too are claimed as God's own and filled with the Spirit to fulfill whatever is asked of us. Today ends our Christmas Season and the Church's celebrations of God being revealed to humanity. We will be entering into a time period where the Scriptures will help to convince us that Jesus is God-with-us. **Homework:** One way of looking at the role of the Godparent is to give them the responsibility of helping the baptized child to experience this 'great power'. Make contact with your Godchild(ren).

Baptism Catechism: The symbols of baptism are: water to wash away sin, the formula containing the invocation of the Trinity (baptize you in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit) to invite us into a life with the Trinity, the candle to let Christ be our light, the white garment to cloth us with purity for a life in heaven, and the Chrism Oil for anointing to the mission of being a Priest, Prophet and Shepherd (sanctifying, teaching, guarding). The Godparents symbolize the community that commits itself to helping the child to grow 'in wisdom and in stature, before God and humans.' (Luke 2:52)

Upcoming canonization of Mother Theresa of Calcutta:

Pope Francis accepted the proof for the miracle credited to the intercession of Mother Theresa, and thus signed off on the last condition for her canonization. While no date has been confirmed for the celebration, it is speculated that it will be in the first week of September to coincide with the date of her death. Read about the inexplicable cure of a Brazilian man suffering from a viral brain infection who unexplainably sat up in bed cured while his wife was praying for Mother Theresa to intercede.

CATHOLIC EDUCATION WEEK- more information coming home soon

We are blessed to have a Catholic School in Smithers. It was built by volunteers with donated materials and money and Department of Indian Affairs funds. It opened in 1958. Well into the 1970s the school was staffed by nuns, brothers, and young, volunteer "frontier apostles" from the United Kingdom and Eastern Canada. Also in the late 1970s, most of our many Catholic students from Moricetown moved to the Moricetown School when it opened. Many other big and small changes have happened throughout the years and here we are: one of eight schools in the Prince George diocese and of 79 in B.C. Our students are part of the over 21,000 students enrolled in Catholic Schools across the province.

ATTENTION FORMER FRONTIER APOSTLES What does it mean for descendants of residential school staff to reconcile with Canadian history? To explore this question, Caroline Crocker, a graduate student at the University of Victoria, is reaching out to other Canadians like herself - people whose parents, grandparents, aunts, uncles or other relatives worked in the Indian Residential School System - to ask them to join a focus group on Saturday, January 30, 2016 to discuss the topic. Caroline's research project is on reconciliation (improving relationships and healing) in Canada between Aboriginal and non-Aboriginal people, specifically in regards to the Indian Residential School system. If you worked at an Indian Residential School and you think possibly your children, grandchildren, nieces or nephews would be interested in participating in this discussion, contact Caroline by phone at 613-986 -2276 or by email at crockerc@uvic.ca for further information.



The Feast of the Baptism of the Lord

In the mystery of Christ's Baptism in the Jordan River, we reencounter and represent the truth of the Lord's incarnation and His manifestation as the Christ. Jesus' Baptism is in fact His definitive manifestation as the Messiah or Christ to Israel, and as the Son of the Father to the entire world. Here we find the dimension of the Epiphany which was His manifestation to all nations. The Father's voice from heaven shows that Jesus of Nazareth is the eternal Son and the descent of the Holy Spirit in the form of a dove shows the Trinitarian nature of the Christian God. Indeed, just as in our bodily members there are certain articulations which distinguish and separate them, so too in this profession of faith, the name articles has justly and rightly been given to the truths we must believe particularly and distinctly." In accordance with an ancient tradition, already attested to by St. Ambrose, it is also customary to reckon the articles of the Creed as twelve, thus symbolizing the fullness of the apostolic faith by the number of the apostles.

192 Through the centuries many professions or symbols of faith have been articulated in response to the needs of the different eras: the creeds of the different apostolic and ancient Churches, e.g., the Quicumque, also called the Athanasian Creed; the professions of faith of certain Councils, such as Toledo, Lateran, Lyons, Trent; or the symbols of certain popes, e.g., the Fides Damasi or the Credo of the People of God of Paul VI.

193 None of the creeds from the different stages in the Church's life can be considered superseded or irrelevant. They help us today to attain and deepen the faith of all times by means of the different summaries made of it.

Among all the creeds, two occupy a special place in the Church's life: 194 The Apostles' Creed is so called because it is rightly considered to be a faithful summary of the apostles' faith. It is the ancient baptismal symbol of the Church of Rome. Its great authority arises from this fact: it is "the Creed of the Roman Church, the See of Peter the first of the apostles, to which he brought the common faith".

195 The Niceno-Constantinopolitan or Nicene Creed draws its great authority from the fact that it stems from the first two ecumenical Councils (in 325 and 381). It remains common to all the great Churches of both East and West to this day.
