Pastor's Note

Fr. Pier Pandolfo St. Joseph's Parish and St. Anthony's Mission Parish

Advent: listen attentively, speak encouragingly

Patience begins with patience for yourself. We are still waiting for the world we long to see. Like our ancient ancestors, we yearn for peace and justice, healing and restoration. Today we are told that the signs of Jesus' presence are all around us, if we know how to see them. We hear in the Gospel the signs we are to look for, especially when we are distracted or doubtful, confused or disappointed. The good news is that there is even more to come. We live in an impatient world, but today we are told: "Be patient!" Homework: Pray with St.Francis deSales "Have patience with all things but first with yourself. Never confuse your mistakes with your value as a human being."

D&P - The 90s {see full excerpt from the D&P publication 50 Years of Solidarity' on bulletin board.} Despite the success in overthrowing oppressive regimes, numerous countries experience a new oppression: debt. By the mid-1990s the countries of subSaharan Africa are paying \$10 billion each year on debt interest alone — 4 times as much as they spend on health care and education combined. The IMF and World Bank promote structural readjustment programs that force countries to pay their debts by privatizing public works and natural resources. In Bolivia, this leads to the Cochabamba Water War, a rebellion by the local population against attempts to privatize public water systems. D&P programs include: 1990 - Nelson Mandela is released from prison. 1990-93 -Rebuilding the Americas is a three-year program that reflects on the meaning of the 500th anniversary of the "discovery" of America. 1994 – Genocide in Rwanda results in the deaths of 800,000 children, women and men, including Development and Peace partners. 1995-97 – People First This campaign calls on Nike and Levi-Strauss to enforce and monitor Codes of Conduct in "sweatshops" where their apparel is made. 1998 -Hurricane Mitch kills 20,000 Central Americans - an emergency appeal raises \$11million. 1998-99 - Debt Cancellation of Developing Countries - 640,000 signatures are collected, the largest number collected in Canadian history.

Advent changes to local mass celebrations: we are highlighting that God is speaking to us in Scripture by using the Book of the Gospels and by singing the Alleluia both at the beginning and at the end of the Gospel reading; we are highlighting the need to listen by praying the Eucharistic Prayer more slowly and with musical accompaniment.

CHRISTMAS CONCERT- DECEMBER 15th

We ask that everyone to be respectful of the church as a sacred space. Please do not bring in beverages, gum, or food. Also, we ask that you remove your hat while in the church. Cell phones need to be turned off for the performance.

HERE ARE A FEW SAFETY CONCERNS THAT WE HAVE SO PLEASE READ AND FOLLOW:

BEFORE THE CONCERT: To ensure safe supervision of all children, we ask that students (except the grade 7s who are the main actors) not be brought to the school before 6 pm. We will open the doors at 6:00 pm and students will wait in the foyer with a supervisor until their classroom teacher comes to get them. Teachers will be arriving at 6:00 to pick up any foyer students and then unlock the classrooms.

AFTER THE CONCERT: we ask that members of the audience remain in their seats for five minutes after the show is over to allow the students to cross the parking lot to the school. It is not safe for vehicles to be backing out with children still crossing the parking lot in the dark! This is a huge safety concern for us.

A Journey Through the Mass

Liturgy of the Eucharist

Starting with the seventh century various forms of purifying the priest's mouth, fingers, and the chalice arose at Rome and elsewhere. The functional task of cleansing is now simplified and may even take place after the celebration to allow both ministers and people an opportunity for prayerful silence or common song before the prayer after communion which serves to conclude the rite.

Even the restoration of the communion procession and communion song is to emphasize the communal dimension. The offering the community has brought to the altar (God's fruit and our work) has been accepted, and we receive as a response of communion.

Reflection

The rites of preparation for communion are a structural link between the eucharistic prayers and the reception of the eucharist. They are to "lead directly to the communion of the people" (Gl no. 56). Their purpose is to prepare the whole assembly for its participation in the Lord's body and blood. Mutual love and reconciliation are the seeds and fruits of the sacrament shared in communal fashion by ministers and people. Just as the elements of bread and wine have been changed, so we commit to being part of a change that brings peace and unity to all of life.

What is the purpose of the rites preparing for communion? To what extend do these rites actually "lead directly to the communion of the people" (GI no. 56)?

From the Catechism of the Catholic Church "PRAYER IN THE CHRISTIAN LIFE"

Prayer as covenant

2562 Where does prayer come from? Whether prayer is expressed in words or gestures, it is the whole man who prays. But in naming the source of prayer, Scripture speaks sometimes of the soul or the spirit, but most often of the heart (more than a thousand times). According to Scripture, it is the heart that prays. If our heart is far from God, the words of prayer are in vain.

2563 The heart is the dwelling-place where I am, where I live; according to the Semitic or Biblical expression, the heart is the place "to which I withdraw." The heart is our hidden center, beyond the grasp of our reason and of others; only the Spirit of God can fathom the human heart and know it fully. The heart is the place of decision, deeper than our psychic drives. It is the place of truth, where we choose life or death. It is the place of encounter, because as image of God we live inrelation: it is the place of covenant.
